

- Please silence all cell phones and any other electronic devices during performances.
- Latecomers to performances should seat themselves between movements or as allowed by performance hall staff and conference volunteers.
- Please refrain from playing or speaking loudly in hallway areas as the sound may carry into the performances spaces and disrupt the events.

ICA VALUES STATEMENT

The International Clarinet Association is committed to fostering a safe and comfortable environment for all its officers, employees, members, performers, students, vendors, business associates, and visitors who attend or participate in any ICA-sponsored event or activity. This means that all participants are treated with courtesy, fairness, and mutual respect while participating in ICA events. Accordingly, the ICA requires its members and affiliates to maintain the highest standard of professional conduct and personal integrity while attending any event or activity sponsored by the ICA.

ICA STATEMENT OF COMMITMENT TO DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION

The ICA promotes clarinetists from all backgrounds coming together for inspiration and for cultivating personal, professional, and artistic excellence, in furtherance of its Mission Statement. All members, employees and participants are responsible for fostering a climate of mutual respect at all ICA events by nurturing an atmosphere that promotes equal opportunity and prohibits discriminatory practices and treatment. The ICA is committed to protecting such an atmosphere for all the participants at its events.

ICA POLICY PROHIBITING HARASSMENT AND DISCRIMINATION

The ICA prohibits any forms of harassment, discrimination, or bullying on the basis of an individual's actual or perceived race/ethnicity, sex, gender identity, sexual orientation, religion, national origin, age, marital status, disability, or any other protected class pursuant to applicable law, in its workplace or at any ICA function or event. Any employee experiencing conduct in violation of this policy can notify a Director without fear of reprisal or retaliation, as any reprisal or retaliation regarding a good faith complaint is strictly prohibited.





LECTURE: "CLARINET CHRONICLES: FINDING YOUR VOICE IN THE FIRST YEAR"- Social Justice in Novice Level Clarinet Education

Presenter: Anoushka Divekar, Director of Clarinet Chronicles

Not until 10 years after starting to play the clarinet did I play a solo work written by somebody that looked like me.

I taught beginning clarinet after vowing to be more intentional in my programming. I helped extend the dissertation of Dr. Maggie Greenwood-of 8000 works written by women, only one of these works was suitable for the scope and skill level of a first-year learner. There were simply no works for the beginner that had diversity at their core and still focused on pedagogical considerations. So, I decided to commission the works that would match those values, and write a method book to motivate each of the progressive pieces.

This lecture will explain how I commissioned 14 new works for beginning clarinet students, and the research behind the pedagogical considerations when writing the method. This research-based approach will help the novice clarinet student become a holistic musician.

Musicians as Athletes transcend past traditions of "no pain, no gain" and that practicing music is more important than self-care. "30-Second Exercises for Musicians" propel us into a transcending future!

Do musicians cross-train? Old traditions say, "No Pain, No Gain!" and keep practicing regardless. How many musicians have hand or body pain? I am developing International Research, Preliminary Results to be presented at ICA ClarinetFest 2025, polling the prevalence of this problem through music university faculty, professionals, and students.

I create transformation by "30-Second Exercises". What if it was a little lily-pad hop to "exercising"? Could our self-definition change to "I'm an exerciser" and then, "I cross-train"?!

30-Second Exercises overcome objections of time, effort, space, equipment, distance. They enable the habit of exercise and self-care, while answering "I don't know what to do." Kit & Marley illustrations, non-threatening white foxes, demonstrate exercise can be fun!

LECTURE: "YOUR BRAIN ON PRACTICE: BEYOND REPETITION FOR EFFICIENT LEARNING"

Many musicians spend tens of thousands of hours practicing throughout their lives, and recent research on the science of learning can help us to get better results with less time and less pain. Traditional practice strategies often rely on repetition as a cornerstone for progress. Current motor-learning research explains why repetition is essential for learning procedural skills like playing and instrument, but also why excessive or mindless repetition leads to stagnant progress, uninspired performance, and even performance injuries like tendonitis and focal dystonia. This presentation explores evidence-based strategies to reap the benefits of repetition without the drawbacks of habituation and fatigue, including augmented feedback, varied practice, mindful attention strategies, micro-breaks, spaced practice, and interleaving. The goal is not robotic replication, but to improve or notice something new in every iteration.

Jayden couldn't be bothered with his clarinet lessons. Traditional teaching strategies weren't working. That is until he became Sir Clarinetto, a hero defending the town of Sharpsburg from all manner of musical mayhem. All it took was a pair of dice and a little creativity.

Incorporating role-playing game mechanics into lessons, students embark on musical adventures where they overcome challenges and trials by performing specific musical techniques - long tones become tests of courage, scales transform into battles against dissonant creatures, and mastered repertoire may at long last vanquish the forces of discord.

As a clarinetist, physical strength is of great importance. After undergoing an abdominal surgery that physical strength has to be rebuilt, changing the practicality of playing and teaching a great deal. Considerable adjustments need to be made, at times even to the physical equipment used. More so, challenges such as how to best utilize practice time, re-learning breathing techniques, and working up endurance again are among the biggest.

Abdominal procedures, or a few, are not particularly uncommon and can happen for a variety of different reasons with different severities. This presentation will provide a perspective of playing again in the midst of recovery; sharing the success, frustrations, and all in between that come with it. Hopefully, sharing this unique perspective will serve as some guidance to those who can relate and awareness for those who cannot. As teachers, there is benefit in being able to guide students who may be affected, whether or not it's relatable.

This presentation emphasizes the mental and emotional side of being a studied musician who is physically limited in what they can do for, what can be, an undetermined amount of time. Shifting our mindset and finding community are among the most beneficial things to be done while rebuilding strength.

A recent project of ours involved selecting a children's book addressing the topic of immigration, commissioning a Latinx composer for original music to accompany the story, and producing a bilingual music video with audio narration in Spanish and English. This project was supported by a \$15,000 arts grant. While the main aim was to produce a music video made available freely for all, it also resulted in a narrated musical work that can be performed live at schools, libraries, and other community spaces. This lecture recital will include a live performance of the narrated musical work followed by a discussion of the steps taken to implement this project as a whole. By sharing our experience, it is our goal to inspire and guide others in the creation of education-based musical projects that promote diversity, inclusion, cross-cultural communication, and artistic democracy.

LECTURE: "CALM BEFORE THE CONCERT: THE INNER REHEARSAL" - A
MUSICIAN-CENTERED APPROACH TO SELF-HYPNOSIS

Presenter: Alessandra White

Concert bands and wind ensembles have historically emphasized discipline over mindfulness, but there's growing interest in integrating these practices into music performance. To align with the 2025 ClarinetFest theme of "Transcending Tradition," I propose a workshop to help musicians create calmer, more enjoyable performance conditions for themselves, their peers, and their audiences.

By expanding expressive possibilities and integrating with the rhythm section, the research aims to compose a piece in the traditional danzón style. It addresses a gap in the literature by analyzing Afro-Cuban melodic improvisation, particularly in montuno sections, applicable to Latin jazz. A multi-method approach, including participant ethnography, case studies, transcription analysis, and expert interviews, was used. Key findings include parameters like ornamentation, rhythmic displacement, and phrasing. A field trip to La Habana, Cuba, provided insights from local musicians on applying these elements. The research culminates in an original composition, Danzón de Noche, showcasing the explored Afro-Cuban characteristics. This study offers valuable insights for clarinetists and composers to integrate Afro-Cuban elements into their work, enriching their musical connection to this tradition.

Clarinetist Chris Mothersole presents selections from his book Delaytudes, a set of ten varied studies for clarinet and delay. Written for performers with all levels of electroacoustic experience, these studies are inspired by the sounds of modern electroacoustic writing and the étude books many clarinetists traditionally encounter in their studies. LECTURE: "MAPPING THE SELF IN PERFORMANCE WORK"

Presenters: Jackie McIlwain (USA) and Shawn Copeland (USA)

As clarinetists and teachers, we spend a great deal of time in the deep minutia of our

work, the micro. These are rhythms, fingerings, phrasing, practicing, and scheduling that all make our work happen. Where are bodies are concerned, we are often chasing comfort and ease so we can feel good while we are working and hopefully preventing injury. When we have done this for a good bit of time, we often amass a substantial list of the things that we know we often do wrong, our blind spots per say, as well as many aches and pains in our bodies that accompany long rehearsals and performances. What is often overlooked is how all of this work down on such a specific level relates to the bigger picture (the macro). The macro is our why, why are we artists, musicians, clarinetists. Why do we feel drawn to perform and teach as our primarily profession? What is our mission in life?

When the micro and the macro are misaligned, our work often is an expression of comparison to others, a reflection of scarcity of time and resources, and the reaction to the expectations of others. When they are aligned, our work becomes deeply fulfilling, harmoniously within our boundaries and integrity, and balanced with our personal lives. Our work can become the authentic expression of Self.

In this workshop, we will explore the concept of the Self and the Self-Map as a path towards aligning the micro and the macro. We will explore methods of incorporating and uniting the various aspects of our Self in our performance and teaching such that we become a more healthy, authentic expression of our Self in our work.

LECTURE: "ROBERT MARCELLUS: HIS STUDENTS' PERSPECTIVES"

Presenter: Colby Spengler

Robert Marcellus was one of the most respected clarinetists and teachers in the twentieth century. The purpose of this research was to collect and compare pedagogical information from the experiences of Robert Marcellus's students from both the Cleveland Institute of Music and Northwestern University. Interviews were conducted with J. David Harris, Diane Barger, David Bell, Steve Cohen, Kathy Jones, Lee Morgan, Michele Gingras, and John Weigand. A similar set of questions were asked to each interviewee. Questions pertained to participants' time frame in studying with Mr. Marcellus. The information

HONORARY MEMBER BIOGRAPHIES

JULIE DEROCHE



Julie DeRoche, Professor of Clarinet and Chair of the Department of Music Performance, has served on the faculty of the DePaul University School of Music since 1984. A student of Robert Marcellus and Clark Brody, she received her degree in clarinet performance from Northwestern University in 1981. She has remained in Chicago since then, developing a significant career as a clarinetist and educator. Ms. DeRoche is an admired clarinet pedagogue, and is frequently engaged to teach and give master classes at clarinet events and conferences throughout the United

States, Europe and Asia.

Ms. DeRoche has performed regularly with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra (CSO) and can be heard on a number of that ensemble's recordings, including the Strauss Die Frau Ohne Schatten (Barenboim), Bruckner Symphony #0 (Solti), Mahler Symphony #9 (Boulez), and Boulez Notations 7, and Stravinsky Le Sacre du Printemps (Barenboim). She toured regularly with the CSO in Europe, South America, Asia and the U. S., and has performed with that organization at the Ravinia Festival. In addition, she served full-time as acting second clarinetist for the 2000-2001 CSO season.

Ms. DeRoche has performed with numerous chamber ensembles in the Chicago area, and has recorded hundreds of radio and TV commercials. She has been actively involved with the International Clarinet Association, serving as Conference Director, Treasurer and President of this organization. In 2013, Ms. DeRoche participated in the prestigious Management Development Program at the Harvard Graduate School of Education, and is excited to have signed on as a



ANNETTE LUYBEN

Annette Luyben started playing E-flat clarinet at the age of 6, taking lessons from her father, Robert (Bob) Luyben. She began taking piano lessons at the age of 4 and a half, then switched from E-flat to B-flat clarinet at the age of 8 and a half. Annette played clarinet throughout elementary and high school. She spent 4 summers at the University of Kansas (KU) Midwestern Music and Art Camp and attended KU where she played principal

E-flat clarinet in the KU Wind Ensemble for 1 year and graduated with a Bachelor of Arts in Education (Social Studies emphasis) in 1965. Upon graduation Annette taught American History and Government at Oak Park High School for 14 years.

In 1948 the famous music store Luyben Music was created by her parents (Bob and Annette) and Annette was a part of the store as a toddler at the age 5, eventually starting to work in the business at age 8. In the early 1970's, Annette's parents became active in summer clarinet symposiums in Denver, which

ultimately led to the creation of the ICA in 1973. At this time, Luyben Music became a leading supplier of music for clarinetists across North America. As her father's health became compromised due to Parkinson's disease, in 1980 Annette started working full time with Luyben Music. Annette's first attendance at an ICA ClarinetFest® was in 1983 and she has attended and exhibited at every ClarinetFest® held in the United States ever since. She also attended the Quebec (1990) and Paris ClarinetFests® (1996). Luyben Music has advertised in every International Clarinet Association journal since the very beginning.

Following the passing of her parents, in 1991 Annette assumed the role as President of Luyben Music. Despite closing the store front in 2020, Annette and her longtime sidekick Rich Coble continue the legacy of being the leader in supplying clarinet music through mail order sales. They also continue the sales of the Luyben ligature that was the invention of her father in 1965 –it remains one of the most popular clarinet ligatures in the world to this day.



ANTHONY MCGILL

Hailed for his "trademark brilliance, penetrating sound and rich character" (New York Times), clarinetist **Anthony McGill** enjoys a dynamic international solo and chamber music career and is principal clarinet of the New York Philharmonic — the first African-American principal player in the organization's history. He is the recipient of the 2020 Avery Fisher Prize, one of classical music's most significant awards, and was named Musical Amer-

ica's 2024 Instrumentalist of the Year.

McGill appears as a soloist with top orchestras, including the New York and Los Angeles Philharmonics, the Metropolitan Opera, and the Baltimore, Boston, Chicago, and Detroit Symphony Orchestras. In the 2024-25 season, he makes his BBC Proms debut performing Mozart's Clarinet Concerto with the BBC Scottish Symphony Orchestra & Gemma New.

Also this season, McGill embarks on a multi-city tour with Emanuel Ax. He joins the performance and recording project Principal Brothers featuring his brother, Demarre McGill, as well as Titus Underwood and Bryan Young, four leading Black American woodwind principals performing the works of three prominent Black composers: James Lee III, Valerie Coleman, and Errollyn Wallen.

He performed alongside Itzhak Perlman, Yo-Yo Ma, and Gabriela Montero at the inauguration of President Barack Obama. American Stories, his album with the Pacifica Quartet, was nominated for a GRAMMY®. He has been a collaborator of the Miró, Pacifica, Shanghai, and Takács Quartets, and performs with leading artists including Inon Barnatan, Gloria Chien, Yefim Bronfman, Gil Shaham, Midori, Mitsuko Uchida, and Lang Lang.

He serves on the faculty of The Juilliard School and is Artistic Director for Juil-

liard's Music Advancement Program. He holds the William R. and Hyunah Yu Brody Distinguished Chair at the Curtis Institute of Music.

McGill's #TakeTwoKnees campaign protesting the death of George Floyd went viral, reaching thousands of individuals. He was invited by the Equal Justice Initiative (EJI) to perform at the dedication of the National Monument to Freedom. Since 2023, he has partnered with civil rights leader Bryan Stevenson to organize EJI classical music industry convenings examining America's history of racial inequality in Montgomery, Alabama.

He is a Backun Artist and performs exclusively on Backun Clarinets. anthonymcgill.com



TAO CHUNXIAO

Tao Chunxiao, born in 1937 in Chongqing, China, is widely recognized as one of the earliest and most celebrated female clarinetists and music educators in the country. A tenured professor of clarinet at the Central Conservatory of Music (CCOM) in Beijing, she has dedicated over five decades to teaching and advancing the art of clarinet performance in China.

Over the course of her distinguished career, Professor Tao has held numerous influential positions, including Director-General of the Department of Education, Science and Technology at the Ministry of Culture of China, Director of the Orchestral Instruments Department at CCOM, President of the Clarinet Society under the Performing Arts Committee of the Chinese Musicians Association (also known as the Chinese Clarinet Association), and Member of the Arts Education Committee of the Ministry of Education of China.

Her formal music education began in 1953 at the Southwest Conservatory of Music (now the Sichuan Conservatory of Music), followed by advanced studies in 1956 at the Prague Conservatory of Music in then-Czechoslovakia. Upon returning to China, she joined the faculty of CCOM, where she has taught for decades, shaping the development of clarinet performance and pedagogy nationwide.

Professor Tao's artistic and pedagogical contributions have earned her both national and international acclaim. In 1959, she was awarded Third Prize in the Wind Instrument category at the 7th World Festival of Youth and Students. In 1986, she was invited to present a solo recital at the International Clarinet Festival in Seattle, USA. She has served as a jury member at many of the world's most prestigious international music competitions, including the ARD International Music Competition in Munich (1987), the "Prague Spring" International Music Competition (1991), the Romania International Music Festival (2003), the Geneva International Music Competition (2007), and the Beijing International Music Competition (2009). In 1998, she served as both Chair of the

Organizing Committee and Jury Panel for the "98 International Clarinet Festival" held in Beijing.

At the national level, she has chaired several major clarinet competitions, including the First, Second, and Third National Clarinet Competitions, as well as serving as a juror for the Golden Bell Competition and the 2014 Clarinet Competition. In recognition of her exceptional teaching achievements, she received the prestigious "Baosteel Excellent Teacher Award" from the Ministry of Education in 2002.

Professor Tao is also a prolific author and educator. Her publications include Clarinet Performance Tutorial, Selected Classical Works for Clarinet, Learn Clarinet with Me, Clarinet Performance and Teaching, and A History of European Wind Music. She also co-authored Introduction to the Physics of Music. In addition, she has produced numerous audio recordings and instructional DVDs that have significantly contributed to clarinet education in China.

Over the course of her long teaching career, Professor Tao has mentored a generation of outstanding students who have become leading figures in China's clarinet community. Many have received top honors at international and domestic competitions and have gone on to hold positions as professors and doctoral advisors at major conservatories. Among them are Fan Lei, Yuan Yuan, Wang Tao, Dong Dejun, and He Yi. These alumni have not only served as jurors and chairs for prominent clarinet competitions both in China and abroad, but have also been invited to perform and conduct masterclasses across the globe.

In their efforts to advance clarinet performance and foster international exchange, Professor Tao's students have organized and led a number of major events, such

Professor of Music at the University of Kansas, **Robert Walzel** previously served as the founding dean of the KU School of Music from 2010-2022. Performing extensively in essentially all mediums featuring clarinet and saxophone, he is hailed by critics as a "remarkable clarinet virtuoso" possessing "great finesse," a "rich, warm, focused tone," and "effortless technique." Walzel has performed in over 30 countries and presented master classes

and lectures at several of the world's leading music schools.

Partnering with pianist Steven Glaser as the Con Fuoco Duo, a collaboration extending 35 years, Walzel has toured as an Artistic Ambassador for the United States Information Agency (Department of State). A proponent of jazz and other culturally influenced music, he has premiered and recorded several new works written for him. He is featured on multiple recording labels including Klavier, Albany, Navona, Con Fuoco Digital, and Mark Records.

For eleven years Walzel served on the faculty at Texas Tech University and as Principal Clarinetist of the Lubbock Symphony Orchestra. Previous administrative leadership positions include those at Sam Houston State University in Texas and at the University of Utah. A Past President of the International Clarinet Association, Walzel was recognized in 2024 as an Honorary Member of this, the world's largest organization of clarinetists. Serving two full terms on the Commission on Accreditation for the National Association of Schools of Music, he continues as a consultant and visiting evaluator for this important academic accrediting agency. Holding baccalaureate and master's degrees in music from the University of Houston, Walzel was named the 2023 Alumnus of the Year for the Moores School of Music. He holds the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the University of North Texas.

Deborah Bish is associate professor of clarinet at Florida State University. She has performed with orchestras throughout the United States, including the Arizona Opera (most notably in a production of the Ring Cycle), the Mainly Mozart Festival Orchestra under the direction of Jeffrey Siegel, the Phoenix Symphony, the North Carolina Symphony, and the Arkansas Symphony. Henri Bok is a worldwide ambassador of the bass clarinet, the instrument to which he has devoted his life as a performer, teacher, improviser, and composer. Currently she is the Assistant Professor of Clarinet and Music Theory at the University of Wisconsin – Stevens Point and principal clarinet of the La Crosse Symphony Orchestra and Central Wisconsin Symphony Orchestra. Sarah is active with the International Clarinet Association and served as the editor for The Clarinet [Online]. She is a Backun artist, performing exclusively on Lumiere clarinets, and a D'Addario Artist, performing exclusively on Reserve Classic Reeds. Prior to her appointment at UWSP, she was the Instructor of Clarinet at Alma College and Albion College.

Sarah's playing has been described as "powerful, rich, and virtuosic." Sarah completed her Doctor of Musical Arts at Michigan State University under the tutelage of Dr. Elsa Ludewig-Verdehr. She earned her Master of Music Performance from the Royal Northern College of Music and her Bachelor of Music Performance from Florida State University. Her primary teachers include Elsa Ludewig-Verdehr, Chris Swann, Deborah Bish, Frank Kowalsky, and Lori Lovato.

Clarinetist Jon Manasse performed to international acclaim as soloist with such orchestras as the Mostly Mozart Festival Orchestra, the Academy of St. Martin in the Fields, the symphonies of Baltimore, Indianapolis and Seattle and in musical centers worldwide. He toured as Guest Principal Clarinetist with the Cleveland Orchestra both at home and abroad on its 2013 European tour. Mr. Manasse is on the faculties of The Juilliard school as well as Lynn and Mannes conservatories. Together with Jon Nakamatsu, he serves as Artistic Co-Director of the Cape Cod Chamber Music Festival.

For more than 40 years, clarinetist/composer Eric Mandat has been on the leading edge of developments in multiphonic, microtonal, and timbral modulation possibilities for the clarinet. Through his explorations Eric has developed a deeply personal artistic expression as a performer and composer, and he is recognized worldwide as one of the foremost authorities on clarinet multiphonics. Eric tours regularly as a concert soloist, performing his works throughout the world. Over nearly three decades on the New York jazz scene, saxophonist, clarinetist, composer, educator and Selmer artist **Mike McGinnis** has amassed a body of

genre-defying work that includes seven albums as a leader. He has explored a range of instrumentation, from Mike McGinnis +9 (Road*Trip, Road*Trip II: Outing) to the multimedia landscape tone poem Angsudden Song Cycle (482 Music); from eclectic chamber jazz as co-leader of The Four Bags and OK|OK to lyrical trio exposition with jazz legends Art Lande and Steve Swallow (Singular Awakening, Recurring Dream, both on Sunnyside).

Additional performance credits include Anthony Braxton, Alice and Ravi Coltrane, Peter Apfelbaum, Gerald Cleaver, Steve Coleman and more.

Mike is musical director of the Davalois Fearon Dance Company. He is on faculty at The New School and the Brooklyn Conservatory of Music. He has performed on Broadway in the Tony-winning Fela! and on film in the Oscar-winning director Ang Lee's Taking Woodstock. Clarinetist and conductor, **Charles Neidich** mesmerizes audiences the world over as one of the most vibrant virtuosos performing today. With a tone of hypnotic beauty and a dazzling technique, Mr. Neidich has received unanimous accolades from critics and fellow musicians both in the United States and abroad. In the words of The New Yorker, ""He's an artist of uncommon merit - a master of his instrument and, beyond that, an interpreter who keeps listeners hanging on each phrase."" He is the winner of numerous international competitions, most notably the ARD Competition in Munich in 1982, and the Naumburg Competition in 1985.

An ardent exponent of new music and a composer himself, he has expanded the technical and expressive possibilities of the clarinet, has sought out works which must be better known, and has championed the works of many of the world's most important composers. He is a leading performer on period instruments and has restored and reconstructed original versions of works by composers from Mozart to Copland.

Mr. Neidich commands a repertoire of over 200 solo works, including pieces written, commissioned or inspired by him, as well as his own transcriptions of vocal and instrumental works. With a growing discography to his credit, Mr. Neidich can be heard on the Chandos, Sony Classical, Sony Vivarte, Deutsche Grammophon, Musicmasters, Pantheon, Bridge, and Bremen Music Hall labels.

Although known as one of the premiere wind soloists in the world today, Mr. Neidich is also a conductor praised for his dynamically expressive performances ranging from historically informed repertoire to contemporary works.

Mr. Neidich has achieved great recognition as an educator in addition to his activities as a performer. He has given master classes throughout the US, Europe, and Asia, and is on the artist faculties of the CUNY Graduate Center, the Juilliard School, the Mannes College of Music, and the Manhattan School of Music.

In 2004, Charles Neidich was awarded the William Schuman Award for Performance and Scholarship at the Juilliard School. Already in its 12th season, together with his wife, Ayako Oshima, he founded the Kitakaruizawa Music Seminar and in 2016, the acclaimed WA Concert Series in New York. In 2018 he was awarded a lifetime membership in honor of his artistic achievements by the International Clarinet Society and a medal for lifetime achievement from the National Society of Arts and Letters. Most recently they established the Artena (Art, Technology, Nature) Foundation to promote worldwide innovation and cooperation through the Arts.

Ayako Oshima, winner of numerous international competitions including the 55th Japan Music Competition in Tokyo, the Winds and Percussion Competition in Japan, and 3rd Prize winner in the 17th International Jeunesses Musicales Competition in Belgrade, where she also received the Golden Harp award given to the favorite of the audience and critics, is one ofthe most popular clarinet soloists in Japan.

Ms. Oshima was a founding member of L'Art Respirant, one of the first new music ensembles in Japan, and also was a member of the noted ensemble, Contrasts Quartet. She has been involved playing historical instruments since 1991 and as a member of the acclaimed period instrument ensemble, Mozzafiato, she has recorded several CDs for the SONY Vivarte label.

In addition to her performing career, she maintains a high profile as a teacher and is on the faculty of the Hartt School, the State University of New York at Purchase, and the Juilliard School. Ms. Oshima has founded and is theDirector of the Kita Karuizawa Music Seminar which attracts clarinet studentsfrom all over Asia and has become the most important clarinet seminar in Japan. Ms. Oshima every summer joins the Qingdao clarinet festival as one ofthe music faculty. With her husband, Charles Neidich, she has written a monthly column on music and the clarinet for Pipers Magazine. She founded the all-female Clarinet Ensemble, the New York Licorice Ensemble which already has released three CDS. They have performed throughout Japan and in New York and have been featured on NHK television.

In September 2017, Ayako Oshima founded the WA Concert Series in New York with the concept of "Great Taste" connecting music and food. Michael Miller, New York Arts wrote: "I should not forget to mention that the last interior page of the program was a menu. Ayako Oshima, an outstanding clarinetist, and Mr. Neidich's wife, is also a chef of high accomplishments........ Both of the Wa Concerts I mentioned ended with a feast of this sort, which unleashed a dash of joyous, appreciative conversation about the music we had just heard."

Rob Patterson is Assistant Professor of Clarinet at Boston University, and Acting Principal Clarinet of the Modesto Symphony. A passionate educator, Rob is on the

faculty for Aria Academy and is a frequent coach with the Boston Youth Symphony.

Recent performances include Copland's Concerto with the Modesto Symphony, Adams' Gnarly Buttons with the Baltimore Chamber Orchestra, Brahms and Mozart Quintets with the Needham Concert Society, and a recital at the Taipei National University of the Arts.

In December 2015, she was invited to perform with the Hong Kong Festival Wind Orchestra as a Buffet Crampon artist, where she played Hasan Niyazi Tura's Clarinet Concerto with the wind orchestra and gave a masterclass in collaboration with Tom-Lee Music and Buffet Crampon.

In August 2016, she was a jury member at the BUFFET CRAMPON CLARINET COMPETITION 2016 in Taiwan, where she also gave a recital and masterclass. On September 25, 2017, she performed a recital at the Buffet Crampon Show Room in New York.

In September 2018, she recorded Max Bruch's Op. 88 Double Concerto for Clarinet and Viola with the Vienna Radio Symphony Orchestra under the baton of Howard Griffiths, alongside Kyoungmin Park, violist at the Berlin Philharmonic. With the support of the Orpheum Foundation, this album was released worldwide by SONY Classical the end of 2019. Selected as a pre-selection jury member at the prestigious 5th International Jacques Lancelot Clarinet Competition in 2020, Ecesu Sertesen was invited to Czechia, Domazlice, once and to Poland three times, where she performed solo concerts and gave masterclasses in Gdansk, Krakow, and Katowice.

In June 2021, she gave masterclasses at the Buffet Crampon USA Virtual Summer Academy. In 2022, she performed a solo concert at the opening of the 11th European Clarinet Congress and, as part of the International Clarinet Association's 50th-anniversary celebrations, gave a solo concert with the USAF Academy Band as the ""Headliner"" artist, gave masterclasses during the event week with nearly 2000 participants. In October 2023, she was a jury member at the FINALIS International Wind Instruments Competition in Bialystok, Poland, followed by masterclasses and concerts at Koszecin Palace. In July 2024, she gave a masterclasses and a concert for the Buffet Crampon Summer Academy in Florida.

Currently, Ecesu Sertesen is the principal solo clarinetist at the Istanbul State Opera and Ballet Orchestra, parallel to her solo and chamber music career. Ecesu Sertesen is the Brand Ambassador for the Buffet Crampon brand.

Beverly Setzer holds degrees in clarinet performance from the University of Washington where she studied with William McColl and William O. Smith. She is principal clarinet of Bellevue and Cascade Symphonies and is a member of Symphony Tacoma, Lake Washington Symphony, Seattle Bass Clarinet Project, the Bavarian Village Band, Roadside Attraction, Banda Vagos, and the Mellifluous Zephyrs and served as principal clarinet of La Filarmónica del Bajío in Guanajuato, Mexico. She enjoys playing a wide variety of music ranging from classical to polkas to jazz.

Sunshine Simmons is currently the Associate Professor of Clarinet at the University of North Florida in Jacksonville, FL. Sunshine has held positions of Principal Clarinet with the Oregon Ballet Theatre, E-flat/section Clarinet with the Kalamazoo Symphony Orchestra, and Bass Clarinet with the New Mexico

Philharmonic, Green Bay Symphony, and Quad Cities Symphony. Nadia Sofokleus (Germany) is a renowned clarinetist and educator born in Cluj-Napoca, Romania. Currently residing in Germany's Black Forest District, Nadia currently serves as the head of the Woodwind department of the MusikakademieVillingen-Schwenningen.

Nadia has claimed top prizes in several Romanian national competitions, including the coveted First Prize and Grand Prize at the national competition "Young Talents." She also secured accolades at the Music Olympiad in Romania and international competitions such as the "Jeunesses Musicales" (1996) and "Saverio Mercadante" (2004).

As a passionate educator, Nadia has taught masterclasses at several esteemed institutions, such as the University of Bucharest, Clarinet Days in Hungary and the ECA Clarinet Congress in Krakow. She has also served as a guest lecturer at the University of Music in Trossingen and actively mentorsstudents for the Blasmusikverband Schwarzwald Baar. Nadia is a proud artist of Chedeville mouthpieces and RZ Clarinets.

Robert Spring is professor emeritus from Arizona State University after retiring in 2024. Described as "one of this country's most sensitive and talented clarinetists," (Arizona Republic), his recordings have been called "truly outstanding, one would be hard pressed to find better performances." He holds three degrees from University of Michigan, received the Citation of Merit Award, was president of

the International Clarinet Association and is now an Honorary Member, holds a Lifetime Achievement award from the Chinese Clarinet Association, and is a Henri Selmer Paris Clarinet Artist

Sputter Box is an innovative clarinet, voice, percussion ensemble based in New York City that is engaging new audiences in contemporary chamber music through their entertaining, interdisciplinary performances. While only a trio, this ensemble moves from "mindfully constructed textures that are light as a feather, and then turn on a dime to explode into something practically orchestral" (Michael Genese). As pioneers for the unique instrumentation, they have commissioned over sixty works and have received grants from Chamber Music America, FROMM Foundation, Brooklyn Arts Council, and Queens Arts Council to produce their concerts in New York City and the US. They have been guest performers and resident artists at Princeton University (2024), University of Florida (2021, 2025), University of North Carolina-Wilmington (2025), UMASS-Amherst (2020), and Columbus State University (2025).

Sputter Box was an Eighth Blackbird Creative Lab Ensemble (2024), Kinds of Kings Bouman Fellowship Collaborating Ensemble (2022), Cortona Sessions Featured Ensemble Fellow (2020), and they performed at the Minnesota Fringe Festival in 2021 and 2022. Sputter Box's commitment to fun, high-quality performances brings an irresistible energy to the stage.

The remaining pieces will showcase the unique traditions of clarinet choir and overall clarinet performance, such as klezmer, jazz, and light pop selections.

Following their inaugural performance at ClarinetFest® 2023, the Army Clarinet Ensemble looks forward to performing on the headliner stage and connecting with the clarinet community in Fort Worth. Gloria Uberto is a young italian clarinetist, born in Chieri on 06.08.2004. She

began studying clarinet at the age of 6 with her father Daniele Uberto. From the very beginning, she partcipated in several prestgious international competitions, obtaining the first absolute prize such as the "Concorso Internazionale Cittá di As\text{\text{\text{0}}}", the renowned "ClarinItaly" competition stands out. Gloria studied at the "G. Verdi" conservatory of Turin, obtaining a first level degree with top marks. She was followed by Maestro C. Chiavazza, V. Mu\u00f3 and F. Schiavonet.

She partcipated in several high-level masterclasses with internatonally renowned teachers such as the first clarinet of Italian Switzerland orchestra Paolo Beltramini, Alessio Vicario, Patrick Messina, Calogero Palermo, Salvatore Passalacqua and Aron Chiesa, took part in several international festivals such as "MITO settembre in musica" and "Clara e Robert Schumann", performed as first clarinet in several concerts conducted by Maestro Marcello Rota and has collaborated in numerous concerts both as a soloist and as chamber music also with the renowned pianist Anna Maria Cigoli. SiHyun Uhm (South Korea) is an accomplished composer, pianist, and multimedia producer based in Los Angeles and South Korea. She has received commissions from prestigious institutions such as the US AirForce Academy Band, Yamaha, Rice University, Columbia Digital Audio Festival, and more. SiHyun has been recognized as a Composer Fellow by the American Composers Orchestra, Nashville Symphony Composer Lab, and has received prizes and awards from the President's Own Marine Band and the Art Council of Korea.

A 2024 recipient of ICA's Honorary Membership, **Michael Webster** had two of his early compositions, Clarinet Sonata and I Remember Lynn performed by Danny Goldman at ClarinetFest in Dublin. Among his contributions to ICA have been writing 85 articles entitled "Teaching Clarinet," organizing the Orchestral Excerpt Competition, and performing frequently at ClarinetFest, most often with the Webster Trio. Fifteen of his transcriptions, mostly for flute, clarinet, and piano, have been published by Presser, International, and Schott. His Five Pieces for Clarinet Solo is still available from G. Schirmer. Echoes and Reflections for 2 solo clarinets, strings, and percussion was inspired by practicing outdoors while at the Santa Fe Chamber Music Festival and premiered in 1978 with Stanley Hasty and Michael Webster as soloists with the Rochester Chamber Orchestra and the Rochester Philharmonic.

Recently retired as Professor of Music at Rice University's Shepherd School of Music, Michael Webster is Artistic Director of Houston Youth Symphony, named 2024 Honored Artists of the American Prize, "limited to a very few who have shown sustained excellence." Formerly Principal Clarinet with the Rochester Philharmonic and Acting Principal with the San Francisco Symphony, he has appeared as soloist with many orchestras, including the Philadelphia Orchestra with Aaron Copland and the Boston Pops with John Williams. He has performed with the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center; the 92nd Street Y; Da Camera, Context, and Musiqa in Houston; the Tokyo, Cleveland, Ying, Muir, Artaria, and Dover String Quartets; and the festivals of Marlboro, Santa Fe, Chamber Music West and Northwest, Norfolk, Victoria, Stratford, Domaine Forget, Angel Fire, Steamboat Springs, Park City, Sitka, Bowdoin, La Musica di Asolo, Skaneateles,

and Orcas Island. Internationally, he has performed and taught in Canada, Mexico, Central and South America, Europe, Japan, China, Australia, and New Zealand.

Duo del Sol, Dr. Karen Dannessa, clarinet and Dr. Henry Grabb, English horn, is an ensemble that "plays with superb chemistry and intonation while cultivating a wide array of colors and moods." (American Record Guide). Both Dannessa and Grabb are professors at the Wells School of Music at West Chester University and both have a DM from Florida State University. They have performed at numerous ClarinetFests, IDRS conferences, throughout the US, London, the Czech Republic, Greece, and Mexico and debuted at Carnegie Hall in New York in 2003. They have commissioned numerous duos from composers such as Danny Dorff, Matt Herman, Jason Haney, Mark Sforzini, Katherine Murdock, Joseph Gregorio, Scott McAllister, Nadine B Silverman and Lori Neprud-Ardovino. Their duo CD, Windward, was released on the Centaur label in 2015

and Quintsylvania Winds, the faculty wind quintet at WCU, will release a new CD of American music in 2025.

Duo LaRo is a clarinet duo co-founded by Rosemary Engelstad and Laura McLaughlin. They prioritize performing works by living composers. Newell holds a MM degree from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln and a BM in clarinet performance from Oklahoma City University where he studied with Dr. Diane Barger, Dr. Lisa Kachouee, and Brad Behn.

Bret Newton is a composer, author, and multi-instrumentalist from the small town of Gainesville, Texas. He holds an undergraduate degree in music theory and composition from the University of Texas at Arlington as well as a master's degree in bassoon performance. He studied bassoon under Charles Hall and Ralph Morgan, contrabassoon under Peter Grenier, Baroque bassoon under Kevin Hall, composition with George Chave, with additional studies from David Maslanka.

Currently, many of the same musicians are recording his even larger Symphony 3, the largest work ever written for wind band.

Newton has also authored three volumes of the encyclopedia-like Band Orchestration textbook series, the most comprehensive guide to composing for the wind band ever assembled.

For the past five years, Newton has also been developing a new addition to the modern bassoon family, the Greatbassoon (bassoon in low G), a long-lost family member that disappeared from the musical world in the early 1800s. The first fully playable prototype is anticipated to be completed before the end of 2024. He currently performs in several ensembles on bassoon, low clarinets, and saxophone.

A native of Marshalltown, Iowa, **Gail Novak** now lives and performs in the Phoenix area. Gail is in demand as a collaborator across the United States and frequently performs with students, professors, and guest artists at Arizona State University. Gail's extensive repertoire list for many different instruments has landed her invitations to perform at the National Trumpet Competition, the International Clarinet Festival, the International Double Reed Society, the National Flute Association, the International Trumpet Guild, the International Women's Brass Conference, and the International Tuba and Euphonium

The Northwest Clarinet Choir is a community-based clarinet choir from Seattle, Washington. Our organization is dedicated to the love of music and the art of clarinet playing, focusing particularly on music for large clarinet ensembles.

Founded in 1995 at the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music, this group of four versatile clarinetists, John Kurokawa, Janice L. Minor, Sarah Nowlin, Anthony J. Costa, has performed recitals and presented clinics/master classes throughout the United States. They are under the direction of Dr. Andrea Vos-Rochefort and Dr. Karen Andreas Bronson.

The U.S. Army Texas Clarinet Ensemble consists of seven active-duty musicians currently serving at the three Army regional bands in the Lone Star State. Their assignments include performing in small woodwind ensembles for ceremonies, formal recitals, and educational outreach; playing in Ceremonial Band and Concert Band for large military and community relations events; and fulfilling other duties as required by the band command team.

The UMKC Conservatory Clarinet Ensemble is comprised of current undergraduate and graduate conservatory students. Evelynn Esquivel launched the ensemble fall 2023 with the goal of expanding her musicianship. The ensemble has provided outreach to schools in the greater Kansas City area and put on recitals each semester. Our goal is to continue to showcase the artistry that clarinetists bring to their craft, highlighting their technical prowess, and emotional depth that elevate their role in music.

The UNF Clarinet Choir under the direction of Dr. Sunshine Simmons, consists of music performance, education, and technology undergraduate students performing engaging original works as well as time-honored classics. This dedicated group of musicians has performed on various stages in Florida, as well as Ireland, Belgium, Nevada, Tennessee, and Colorado. Playing a variety of literature, the students rotate parts so they have an opportunity to perform on the various clarinets utilized in a clarinet choir.

The United States Army Field Band has been thrilling audiences of all ages for more than six decades. As the premier touring musical representative for the United States Army, this internationally-acclaimed organization travels thousands of miles each year presenting a variety of music to enthusiastic audiences throughout the nation and abroad. Through these concerts, the Field Band fosters the support of the American people for members of the armed forces and supports diplomatic efforts around the world.

This clarinet ensemble is comprised of members of the Concert Band's clarinet section and is an example of the organization's education outreach ensembles. These small groups develop positive connections through live music to connect with and inspire the next generation of professionals.

The University of Texas at El Paso Clarinet Choir is an ensemble founded in 2018 that coincided with the appointment of Jim Logan as clarinet professor. The

UTEP Clarinet Choir has since performed virtually at ClarinetFest in 2020, TMEA in 2022 as well as recitals on campus each semester.

The University of Texas at San Antonio Clarinet Choir is comprised of approximately 20 undergraduate students and includes students of various non-music majors. In just their second year of existence, The UTSA Clarinet Choir was selected to perform at the 2024 Texas Music Educators Association Convention in San Antonio, where they premiered two new works that were composed specifically for the ensemble. They are directed by Dr. Nicholas Councilor, Assistant Professor of Practice in clarinet.

The Willinger Duo, brothers Elisha and Lior Willinger, is dedicated to pushing the boundaries of the clarinet and piano duo by embracing a multidimensional approach to citizen artistry. The Duo is passionately committed to delivering exciting performances to audiences, expanding the repertoire for clarinet and piano by commissioning and transcribing works written by composers from diverse backgrounds, engaging with communities through interactive performances, and sharing the fun and importance of collaboration through educational outreach.

Tiger Lily Trio is a faculty-ensemble-in residence at the University of Delaware School of Music. Its members include Eileen Grycky, flute; Christopher Nichols, clarinet; and Marie-Christine Delbeau, piano. Its performances of contemporary literature by living composers have garnered it invitations to appear throughout North America and Europe at National Flute Association Conventions (2021 and 2023), National Association of Collegiate Wind and Percussion Instructors Conference (2017), International Clarinet Association ClarinetFest (2023), and the Victoria International Arts Festival in Gozo, Malta (2022). They are dedicated to performing the music of marginalized composers and are active in commissioning new works for the medium. Recent commissions include trios by Jennifer Margaret Barker, Anthony O'Toole, Roger Zare and Cynthia Folio.

Dr. Suzanne Tirk is Associate Professor of Clarinet and Assistant Director of the School of Music at the University of Oklahoma. A dynamic performer and pedagogue, Suzanne has presented numerous performances, masterclasses, and workshops throughout the Americas, Europe, Asia, and Australia. She currently serves as principal clarinet with the Norman Philharmonic and performs as a member of "Duo Iona," an ensemble dedicated to the commissioning and performance of works for clarinet and trumpet. Suzanne is a Henri Selmer Paris Artist.

Born in Catania in 2002, **Natale Emanuele Tomarchio** undertook the study of clarinet from a very young age at the "G. Verga" music-oriented middle school and in the musical Wind Band ensemble of Viagrande (CT). He graduated in

clarinet in March 2025 with highest honors from the "Vincenzo Bellini" Conservatory of Catania.

In addition to devoting himself to concert and training activities concerning the instrument, he has to his credit several arrangements and transcriptions for clarinet choir and orchestral ensembles published by distinguished editors.

Tosca Duo, founded in 2007, is the ensemble in residence at the annual Stetson University Clarinet Clinic and performs regionally and nationally. Founding member Shawn Copland retired from performing in 2024; Stetson faculty member and alumnae Jessica Speak turns a page in the Duo's story. Their premiere performance as Tosca Duo took place in March 2024. Both Musco and Speak are highly regarded pedagogues and performers and are Artist/Clinicians for Buffet Crampon.

Juan Tovar is an avid orchestra and chamber musician, teacher and conductor who started his training in El Sistema in Venezuela. He holds a master's degree in Clarinet Performance from the University of Massachusetts Amherst and also obtained a bachelor's degree in Psychology in Venezuela. Allison Storochuk is professor of clarinet at Missouri State University. Originally from Edmonton, Alberta, Canada, she is principal clarinet of the Springfield Symphony Orchestra and the Ozarks Lyric Opera. She holds degrees from Arizona State University, Northwestern University and the University of Alberta.

Trio de Bois has enjoyed an active career for over a decade, including performances at the 2012 Imani Winds Chamber Festival, ClarinetFest 2021, IDRS Conferences in 2022, 2023, and 2024, and numerous recording projects

including Taking Root in 2019. The ensemble thrives in collaborating with composers, and their 2020 Call for Scores Project expanded the trio repertoire with over 30 works by composers from around the world.

Trio des Éléments, featuring Sarah Manasreh-Decker, clarinet, Zachary Preucil, cello, and Katherine Petersen, piano, began working together in 2021. Described as "Fresh as a summer garden," with performances that are "exciting" and "tightly controlled, "they have performed for audiences all over the Midwest including the International Music Foundation's Rush Hour Concert Series and Mackinac Arts Council summer series. 


